<u>Director's</u> <u>Message</u>



2014 marked a year of change, innovation, and community

involvement at CCDJFS. The level of change was obvious just in the many new faces we see every day in our halls. We hired over 25 new employees—most filling already existing positions.

Innovation was apparent in the efforts we must make in the Public Assistance Division as we work with a new state-of-the-art computer system for one program while at the same time maintaining other programs with technology dating from the mid-1980's.

In 2014, we explored opportunities for new ways of doing business at the county, district, and state level with emphasis on a Shared Services model for our customer services.

From May-October, we once again operated our Summer Youth Employment Program. Over 60 county employers participated in this program which provided 240 youths from low-income families an opportunity to earn a paycheck and gain work experience.

In November, the renewal of our Abused Children's Levy was on the ballot. We engaged in community education and outreach to ensure its passage. We were delighted to have this effort favorably received by the community with the levy being supported by over 60% of our voters.

We here at CCDJFS are humbled by our responsibility to the community and grateful for the opportunity to serve that community. We hope that our efforts help to make it a better place to live, work, and raise a family.

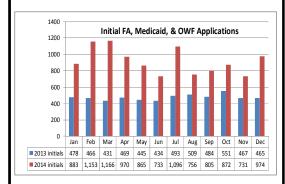
770 people were enrolled in the Healthcare Marketplace/Medicaid Program. 80% of those enrolled were for Medicaid.
